Her attire matched that of her two human companions, Elly McGuire (author of the book) and "Meteorologist Ron" Trotta. The trio travels all over the country to teach children about the weather and to encourage them to follow their dreams.

McGuire read her book to the 150 assembled kindergartners and first-graders while utilizing a large white board in back of her to display the artwork. The book explained how Schmitty used her senses to detect changes in the weather and how much she wanted to help her "two-legged Dad" land that TV weather reporting job.

"If you want to learn the weather, clap your hands," everyone sang.

Each child was given a flyer teaching them 10 facts about the weather. Topics covered were clouds, lightning, thunder, snow, rain, the definition of precipitation, temperature, tornado, hurricane and global warming.

Another part of the message was that every boy and girl should follow their dreams. They could become meteorologists, too, if they want to, or maybe even president of the United States.

Then Schmitty came out to join the festivities. She didn't seem the least bit disturbed by all of the excited children. She apparently knows how to talk, too, but only McGuire and Trotta seem capable of hearing her tiny voice.

Each child had a brief chance to personally greet Schmitty after the program. It was deemed a success by school staff.

"We're always trying to integrate literacy with science," said a delighted Principal Gayle Hills. "The program was just right for them. The children were very attentive."
